

# Endura Windchill

If there's one company that should know a thing or two about producing autumn and winter gloves, it's Edinburgh-based Endura.

I was expecting some good things from its Windchill gloves, and in general they were pretty good. There's a decent amount of insulation and the upper was impressively windproof. However, Endura's assertion that these gloves are water-resistant did not, in my experience, hold water. I found them to be no better than some of the other gloves on test; if anything they retained water more than the other similarly priced gloves.

Another problem with these gloves is that the black area around the wrist is quite firm and inflexible, which means they don't stuff down as small as some of the other gloves, so are harder to squeeze into a pocket.

The gel padding on the palm helped to soak up road vibrations and they were quite comfortable.
